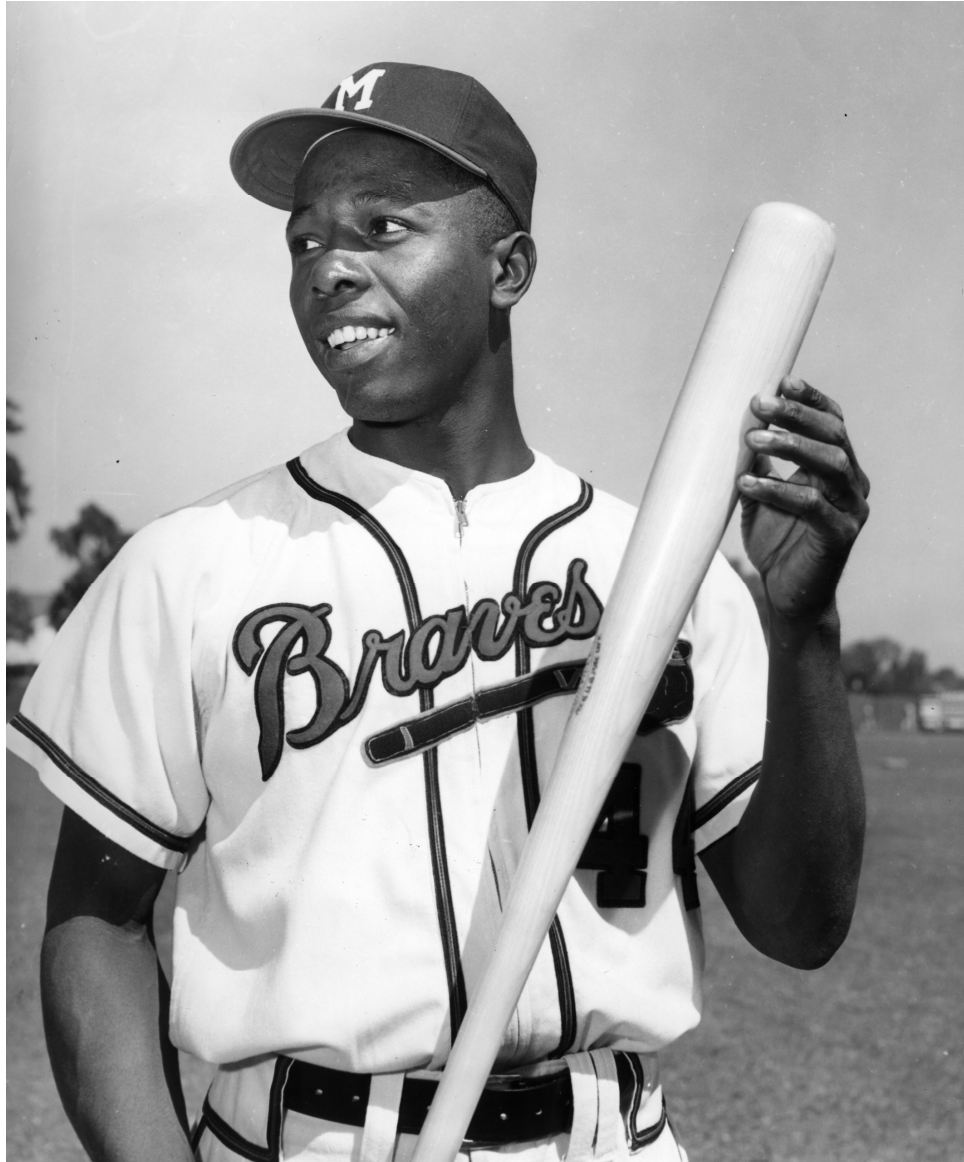



Introduction




- P01-P06: Pins, buttons, coins




